
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The barriers to affordable and adequate housing

To celebrate World Habitat Day this year, we held the third webinar in our Housing Series, and we were honoured to be joined by Ricky Chu Man-kin, Chairperson of the Equal Opportunities Commission and Susan Araka, Housing Development Expert at the Regional Office for Africa, UN Habitat, Nairobi. The World Habitat Day theme was 'Mind the Gap. Leave No One and No Place Behind' and the moderator was Karen Lee, Chartered Town Planner and Project Manager, Jockey Club Design Institute for Social Innovation at The Hong Kong Polytechnic University (PolyU). Karen sits on the Habitat Hong Kong Public Policy & Programmes Committee and has brought her experience and expertise to guide our strategic focus on our policy work and our recently launched Ageing in Place pilot programme, and so we were thrilled Karen was able to moderate this important conversation.

In this session, we explored the housing inequalities faced by people in cities around the world and how these same systemic inequities could be addressed in Hong Kong. If you missed it, you can view the recording here.

A key takeaway for me was Susan's answer to the question of what makes an inclusive city. Susan said that an inclusive city is somewhere where both a child, and an elderly person, can exist without fear of exclusion. This is where the adoption of Universal Design principles in new building developments, residential and commercial, is so critical in providing universal accessibility to housing and the wider city.

I also had the opportunity to co-author an opinion piece with Ricky Chu, published in the SCMP on ingrained inequities that prevent access to decent and affordable housing for vulnerable communities. Inequality of access to decent housing is both a global and local issue, as the pandemic and climate change exacerbate social disparities. Housing is not so much a commodity as a fundamental right, to address the problems facing marginalised groups.

At Habitat Hong Kong, we will continue to work on addressing these growing inequalities in housing to ensure that no one is left behind. We need your help, and we can't do it alone. Please sign up to become a monthly donor now and help us to build hope for a brighter future.
