March 2026

Wang Fuk Court Fire

On 26 November 2025, a catastrophic fire swept through Wang Fuk Court in Tai Po, claiming 168 lives and displacing nearly 2,000 families. We mourn those who were lost and stand in solidarity with the survivors whose lives have been irreversibly changed. This tragedy underscores not only the urgency of immediate relief, but also the critical need for sustained, long-term housing support to help families rebuild their futures with dignity.

Habitat for Humanity Hong Kong is committed to playing a central role in the long-term recovery of affected families. Building on our expertise in post-disaster housing and our deep understanding of the needs of elderly residents in Hong Kong, we are developing a three-year plan to deliver comprehensive housing services. This plan is being shaped in close consultation with transitional housing operators, frontline social workers, and the families themselves to ensure our support is responsive, integrated, and impactful.

From the outset, our response has been highly targeted, guided by real time requests from Transitional Housing Centres, elderly centres, and the social workers assigned to each family. To ensure coordination with major institutional efforts, including those led by the HKSAR Government, we have kept the Housing Bureau informed of our activities. We have also formally registered our response initiatives through the Hong Kong Council of Social Service platform, reinforcing our commitment to a unified and sustained recovery effort.

While planning for long term recovery, we remain focused on addressing immediate needs. Through our service days, families receive essential household items such as beds, bedding, tables, chairs, wardrobes, rice cookers, portable heaters, blankets, and kettles. These items offer not only practical support but also contribute to restoring a sense of safety, comfort, and emotional stability during a time of profound upheaval.

Together, we can make a lasting difference. With the ongoing support of donors, volunteers, and partners, we can help bring hope, stability, and brighter futures to the families of Wang Fuk Court.





Our organisation worked closely with The Lutheran Church Hong Kong Synod to provide rapid support through networking, logistics, winter kit distribution, and on-site volunteer coordination at two transitional housing sites. Our efforts were recognised and praised by Deputy Financial Secretary Michael Wong and Secretary for Housing Winnie Ho during their site visits, with gratitude conveyed for our swift and solid response to the community's urgent needs.

To ensure effective collaboration and alignment with broader institutional efforts, we kept the Housing Bureau updated and registered our initiatives on the Hong Kong Council of Social Service platform. We also established partnerships with NGOs offering complementary health and food support, ensuring ongoing coordination and maximizing the impact of recovery efforts for the Tai Po community.



Our Response

Emergency relief and early support

(November 2025)



Immediately activated our network of NGO partners and elderly centres, while engaging new partners including transitional housing operators, to assess urgent needs following the fire.



Coordinated all actions closely with NGO partners and the social workers appointed to the families by the Social Welfare Department, to ensure our support was tailored to the needs communicated directly by frontline teams.



Launched a fundraising campaign on the Give.Asia platform and reached out to our donors for support.



Critical aid distribution

We delivered critical items to Sik Sik Yuen Ho Hong Neighbourhood Centre for Senior Citizens, the Neighbourhood Advice-Action Council, and the New Territories PHAB Centre.

Our Response

Short term support

December 2025 - February 2026



Organised multiple large-scale service days with up to 100 volunteers to distribute household kits, blankets, cleaning supplies, and other essential items, as well as arrange deliveries and conduct furniture installation work.



Arranged procurement and delivery of electric kettles, rice cookers, furniture, portable heaters, extension cords, bedding, and other household essentials, and prepared and equipped 170 transitional housing units in one site alone, as well as assisted with six sites in total.



Implemented a range of our Ageing in Place home modification services in homes that are not adapted to the needs of the elderly or wheelchair users, including anti-slip floor coating, beds, sturdy tables and chairs, etc.



Delivered over 140 essential household items to transitional and temporary housing sites across Hong Kong and provided direct support to households relocating into or within transitional housing, supplying and installing essential appliances and furniture according to each family's needs.



To date, we have delivered essential household items to a range of transitional, temporary, and private housing locations across Hong Kong. Each family faces unique challenges, and our support has been adapted accordingly.

Volunteer Engagement

We were thrilled to receive an overwhelming level of support from the community, with more than 1,000 individuals signing up to volunteer. Of those, 203 mobilised their time and energy across 15 services days. Their commitment played a vital role in enabling us to deliver emergency relief, coordinate distributions and preparing temporary homes for affected families. Next Steps



Support family relocations and complete installations as households continue to move between shelters, hotels, family accommodation, and transitional housing units.



Respond to new requests and provide case-by-case assistance to meet specific housing needs, whilst also evolving discussions around medium and long-term support needed.



Continue working with social workers and heads of transitional housing centres to identify urgent priorities that are housing related and where appropriate, connect families to holistic services beyond the scope of our programming, including medical care and counselling.



Continue mobilising volunteers and contractors to prepare transitional homes with essential furniture, appliances, and adaptation.



Develop and implement a three-year plan to support families in the longer-term.



Families affected by the Tai Po fire will receive tailored housing support in transitional and, where needed, permanent housing. The estimated level of assistance Habitat Hong Kong can provide, with the generous support of our donors, will be tailored to each household's specific needs and may vary:

- Essential housing support: approximately HKD 2,000 per household
- Comprehensive housing support: up to HKD 50,000 per household

Support may be phased over time, recognising that some families may need assistance and multiple touch points with our team for several years before they are able to settle into permanent housing.

Case Study - Mr & Mrs. Lau

After the devastating fire at Wang Tai House, Wang Fuk Court, Mr. and Mrs. Lau, both aged 59, lost their home and nearly all their belongings. The government urgently relocated them to Eminence Tower I at Hung Shui Kiu/Ha Tsuen Dedicated Rehousing Estate, far from their familiar neighborhood and support networks.

The sudden move took a toll on Mrs. Lau, who works in Fo Tan and now faced a difficult three-hour daily commute. The stress of relocation and lengthy travel began to impact her health, both physically and mentally, but she had no alternatives.



Amidst these challenges, we immediately helped the Lau family select and order new essential furniture and appliances, dining table, stools, bunk bed, sofa, desk, kitchen and shoe cabinets, wardrobe, TV stand and television, as well as cooking utensils, helping them start over with dignity.



Just as things began to stabilise, they received unexpected news: they would receive a rent subsidy. They decided to move to a more convenient location, so they found a flat near Mong Kok Station, but moving their heavy new furniture was daunting. Overwhelmed, they couldn't manage alone.

Once again, we mobilised support, sending a team of eight dedicated volunteers and two professional contractors to help. The volunteers worked tirelessly, carrying all heavy furniture and other items into the new Mong Kok home. The team stayed to assemble and arrange the furniture, ensuring the new space was safe, comfortable, and ready for Mr. and Mrs. Lau to settle in.

Case Study - Mr & Mrs. Wong

Mrs. Wong, aged 72, and her husband lived peacefully in Wang Chi House, Wang Fuk Court, Tai Po. However, their lives were upended by a devastating fire that swept through Wang Fuk Court, leaving them suddenly homeless and stripped of their essential possessions.

Following this tragedy, the government relocated them to Eminence Tower I, within the Hung Shui Kiu/Ha Tsuen Dedicated Rehousing Estate (DRE). Their new room was furnished with only the most basic facilities and a handful of small appliances. Amidst an outpouring of donations from various sources, their room quickly filled with supplies. Unfortunately, limited storage space meant that their living area became cramped and cluttered, forcing Mr. and Mrs. Wong to adapt to an uncomfortable and temporary living situation.



Life in the new district brought additional challenges. The colder weather in the North District caused Ms. Wong to fall ill several times since their move. The lack of heating and the crowded environment further impacted their wellbeing.

Recognising their urgent needs, we provided essential items, including heaters, electric heating pads, and bathroom heaters, allowing Mr. and Mrs. Wong to weather the winter comfortably and safely.

But the support didn't stop there. We also helped to improve their living environment for the long term. Professional measurements were taken to optimise their limited space, followed by the installation of new wardrobes, TV cabinets, and kitchen shelves to increase storage and reduce clutter. Existing lights were replaced with brighter ones to improve the feel and function of their home, and foldable tables were swapped out for sturdier tables designed for elderly.



Fortunately, with the help of Habitat, we have regained a warm home.

Case Study - Mr & Mrs Cheung

Mrs Cheung and Mr Cheung, both aged 80, lost their home in the Tai Po fire and were relocated to Eminence Tower I. Facing unfamiliar surroundings and limited facilities, they received practical support from Habitat for Humanity Hong Kong, helping them to regain safety and comfort.

In their initial resettlement, Mrs Cheung, Mr Cheung, and their domestic worker faced cramped conditions, with the domestic worker sleeping on the floor. We provided a bunk bed allowed them to rest comfortably on the lower bunk and the domestic worker to have her own space above.



Mrs Cheung, who has limited mobility and relies on a wheelchair, often faced difficulties during the night when needing to use the bathroom. To address this, we provided a commode chair, making night-time routines safer and reducing accident risks. Understanding the dangers of slips and falls for elderly residents, we also installed anti-slip flooring in the bathroom to further ensure the couple's safety and confidence when moving around.

In addition to these key supports, we delivered a comprehensive set of furniture to help the Cheungs better organise their living space and improve their comfort. This included a bedframe, wardrobes, bookshelves, TV cabinet, shoe rack, compact dining table, and more. Each piece was chosen to optimise their limited room and make daily living easier and brighter.



The improvements have greatly enhanced Mrs Cheung and Mr Cheung's quality of life. With safer, more accessible living conditions, they now enjoy greater confidence, independence, and comfort in their new home, regaining dignity and hope after a difficult period.



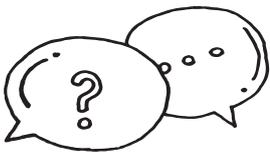
