

HOW DOES CLIMATE CHANGE IMPACT

VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES?

We must collectively confront the impact of climate change on the families we serve

On World Environment Day 2021, Habitat for Humanity released our position on housing and climate change.

Today we are faced with an unprecedented global housing challenge, which is further exacerbated by an unprecedented climate challenge. In the last six months, about 10.3 million people were displaced by climate change-induced events such as flooding and droughts. We have a responsibility to recognise that climate change has a disproportionate impact on the millions of vulnerable people we serve, and that to be accountable to them, we must address that impact through resilient housing.

In Bangladesh, we launched a disaster resilience improvement project in a disaster-prone district of Patuakhali for 74 families in need. In the Philippines, we built disaster-resilient and eco-friendly bamboo homes and developed sustainable communities for 10,000 informal settler families living in danger zones. In Nepal, we brought community members together and facilitated action-focused discussions around the hazards and risks of disasters. We will continue to work with our local partners and empower those who are vulnerable to the effects of climate change to create stronger, more resilient communities across the region.

At Habitat, we believe adequate and affordable housing can be built sustainably and will contribute to the achievement of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. We believe we must be humble in the face of new opportunities and challenges, recognising the need to minimise our own environmental impact as we work to ensure that everyone has a decent place to live, now and into the future.

Our local impact

To find out more about our local impact, take a look at our annual report. FY20 was a year of challenge and transformation on multiple levels. In the first half of the fiscal year, we were busy with our local programmes, providing improved living conditions for over 170 families living in dilapidated public housing apartments in Hong Kong. We welcomed hundreds of volunteers to take part in our Project School Works service days and to celebrate the Mid-Autumn Festival in September 2019, we repaired and repainted the homes of elderly families and made mooncakes with residents of the SAGE Bradbury Home for the Elderly.

We were also busy scaling up our public policy efforts and in July 2019, more than 50 delegates from Hong Kong and colleagues from Habitat Cambodia, Philippines, Indonesia, and Bangladesh attended the Asia-Pacific Housing Forum Hong Kong event. Housing experts and key stakeholders joined a closed-door roundtable session to discuss how Habitat for Humanity Hong Kong can contribute to addressing the root causes of housing issues and impact systemic change in Hong Kong.

Together, we build a better future

The Hong Kong Housing Authority (HA) is relocating residents of four blocks at Pak Tin Estate in Sham Shui Po to new buildings next to its original location soon. The four buildings (Block 9, 10, 11 and 13) were built between 1975-1979. The building age is over 42 years.

In this phase starting from August 2021, there will be roughly 150 elderly households moving to new buildings across the street.

Thanks to our NGO partner, the Neighbourhood Advice-Action Council (NAAC) Pak Tin Community Service Team, for packing and distributing our home hygiene packs to families who will be moving soon. We hope our efforts can help to keep them safe and reduce their economic burden in the midst of COVID-19 pandemic.


