Exploring new housing solutions

I hope you are all able to stay cool in this summer heat. I am writing this in a heatwave in the UK where, after three years, thanks to the deep trust I have in the Habitat Hong Kong team I have been able to switch off, take a long overdue break and reflect on all our achievements over the past year.

June was a particularly important month with the launch of our new Housing Series and the opening of our first ever pop-up Community Space and Emergency Shelter! I am also proud to share that in the past twelve months thanks to your support, we have served over 6000 vulnerable families through deep cleaning, repairs and renovation services and distributed 5559 home hygiene kits. We have also been busy collaborating with other organisations, NGOs, and sector experts to explore new housing solutions.

One of the exciting projects we have been working on is Housing in Place: Quality Living for Sustainable Hong Kong (HiP). The project was conceived by Dr. Juan Du, Honorary Professor at the University of Hong Kong's Faculty of Architecture, to research and design alternative housing solutions and community spaces located in urban centres and neighbourhoods served best by public transportation and civic institutions. HiP examines how the thousands of underutilised buildings that are temporarily vacant or awaiting lengthy redevelopment processes could be used to generate quality housing spaces in accessible locations, improve existing housing stocks, and provide crucial community spaces in areas with the highest concentration of population in need of social services. In this phase of the project, HKU's Urban Ecologies Design Lab (UEDL) have transformed four floors of a vacant building in Jordan to provide quality spaces for emergency housing and community facilities. The HiP Emergency Shelter and Community Space is now open, and we are working with local partners including Praxis, Impact HK and Justice Centre, to use the space for the local community and serve thousands of residents over the next few months with meal distribution, legal consulting, and home improvement training. Recently, our Project Home Works team went to Cheung Hong Estate and delivered deep cleaning services for elderly families living in substandard conditions. This is Grandma Zhu – she told us that one of the biggest issues in her home was that she was not able to clean her fans because they are too high for her to reach. Her knees were also not as strong as before, so she could not stand for long and do a thorough deep clean of her own home.

We were glad to have two local domestic workers to deep clean all her fans, toilet, and throw away food that had gone bad. As summer approaches, Grandma Zhu can now use her fans for better air circulation and quality of sleep. Just a simple deep cleaning process can help the elderly such as Grandma Zhu to improve her living situation significantly.

Our global impact

Thank you all for your donations and support for our Ukraine crisis response so far.

As of June 2022, 2600 travel kits were distributed to refugees in Romania at the main borders in Isaccea and Siret and at the Bucharest North Railway Station, where many refugees are transiting to other parts of Europe. 25,000 people were supported through the donations of furnishings, food and household items from Habitat Poland's ReStore in Warsaw and through electric heaters and air-conditioning units that Habitat provided to transit centers in Romania. 300 refugees from Ukraine are living in spaces refurbished by Habitat Romania that are provided by civil society partners and state institutions as interim shelter solutions of up to six months. 2,750 refugees have been provided with short-term accommodations in Romania, Poland and Hungary. 1,255 refugees have been provided with mid- and long-term accommodations across Poland, Romania and Hungary. 1 new law is being leveraged to support refugees from Ukraine. The law, originally passed in 2021 through Habitat Poland's advocacy, is crucial for helping cities and municipalities scale up social rental housing programs, thus increasing access to housing for
